Our work builds a more equitable global workforce and advances the UN Sustainable Development Goals for Decent Work and Reduced Inequalities.

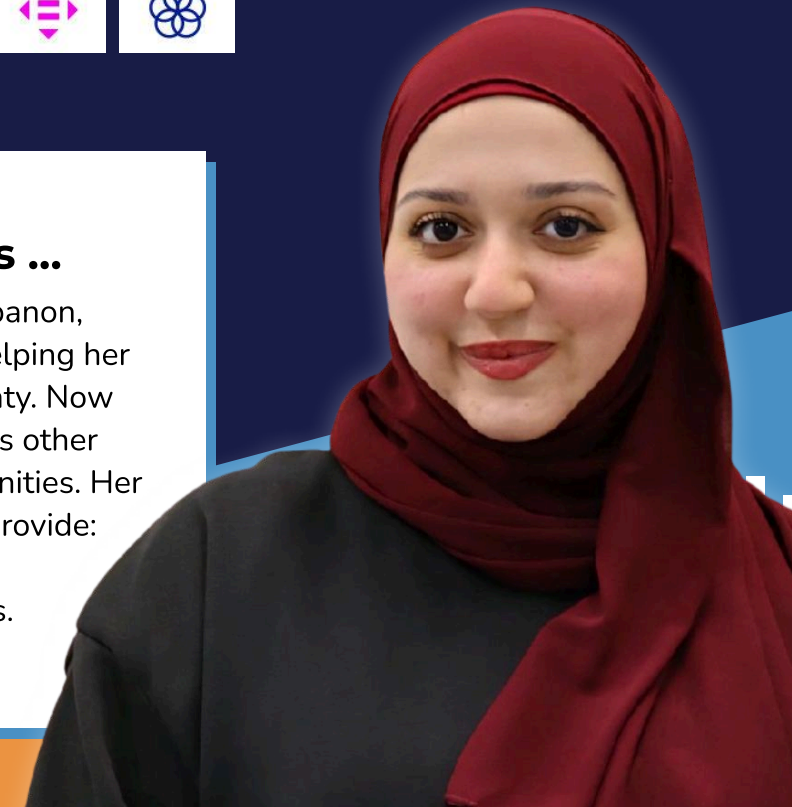
## What We Support

# Year in Review

In 2025, GMI grew to a global student community of **15,000 across 150+ countries**, uplifting climate leaders, expanding into refugee-focused regions and launching Spanish-language programming across Latin America.

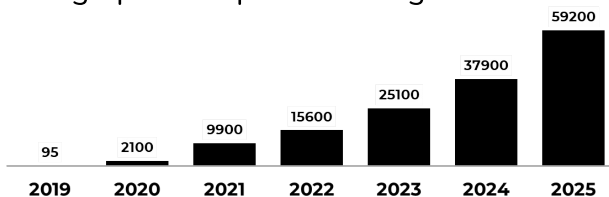


## One Vision, Many Languages

Our continued partnership with **Baker Hughes Foundation** enabled GMI to launch our mentorship program in Spanish, breaking barriers and broadening access across Latin America.

# 59,200 HOURS

A record number of volunteer hours logged in 2025, with many mentees becoming mentors themselves, accelerating equity through peer-to-peer learning.



## Corporate Pathways: 30+ Microsoft Data Centers

In partnership with Microsoft, we created pathways for students to launch careers in their own communities, with direct access to high-demand data center jobs.

## Evolving in the Age of AI

In October, GMI hosted 17 virtual volunteering events and gathered over 500 insights from **Microsoft, Foundever, and LinkedIn** employees - fueling curriculum updates that keep us innovating and leveraging AI to empower the job search.

## Serving Displaced Learners

In conflict-affected regions, GMI supported refugee students through expanded partnerships with USA for UNHCR and over 20 refugee-serving youth partners.



## From Mentee to Mentor

**88 graduates in 31 countries** returned as mentors, fueling a model of local leadership and generational impact.

## University of Nairobi: 2,000 students and counting

GMI's most invested youth partner is helping scale inclusive access to opportunity—empowering the next generation and multiplying impact.



## Open Enrollment Expands Access

Launched in 2025, open enrollment is now our top source of students. It gives young people—no matter where they study or live—a direct path to join GMI. This removes barriers, reaches more diverse talent, and helps us grow faster and more equitably.

# The Challenge

## Underemployment is widespread

More than half of college graduates are in jobs that don't require a degree within a year of graduation.

## First-generation disadvantage

First-generation college graduates earn less and have less wealth compared to peers whose parents hold degrees.

## Global impact

First-generation and low-income students are disproportionately represented among displaced learners and refugees, further compounding barriers to securing meaningful employment.

## Career launch gap

Research highlights that while education attainment is rising, the job-finding rate among young graduates has declined since 2000, making the first career step harder than ever.

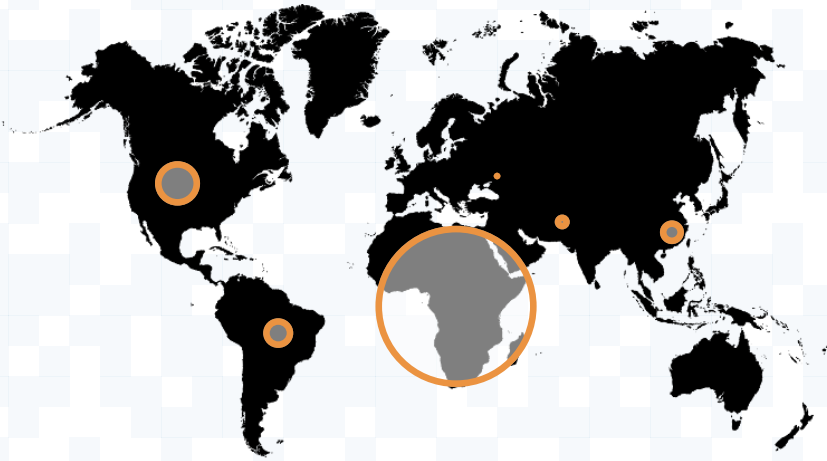

## 2025 Student Registration by Region



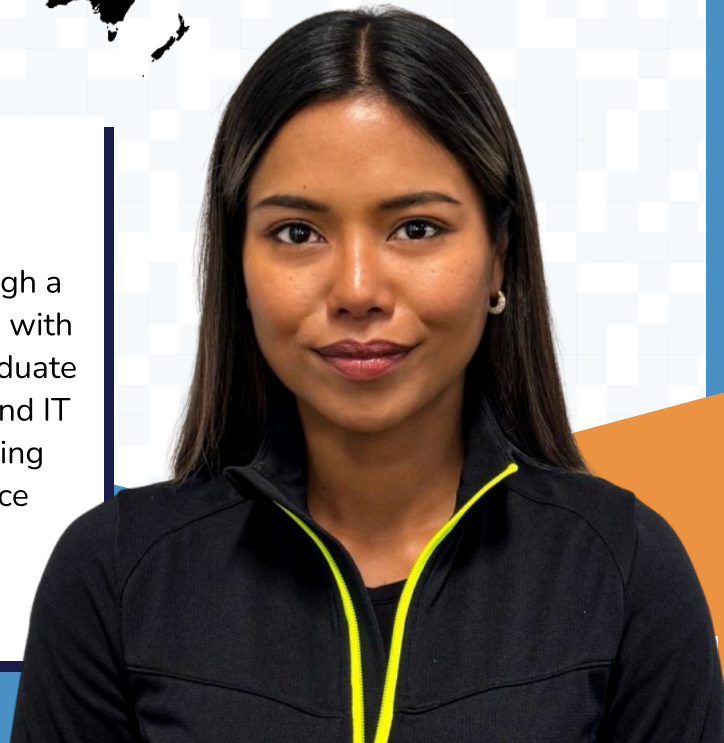

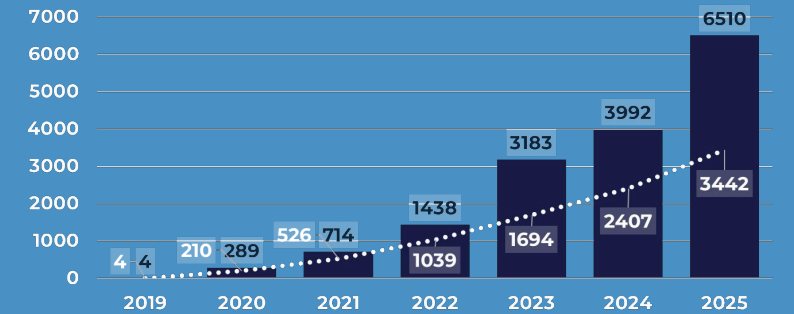

## 2025 Mentor Registration by Region



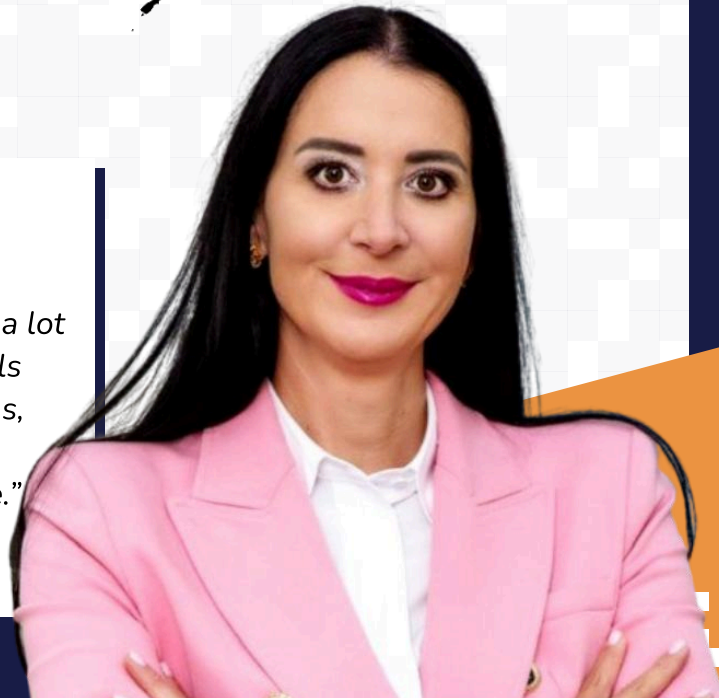

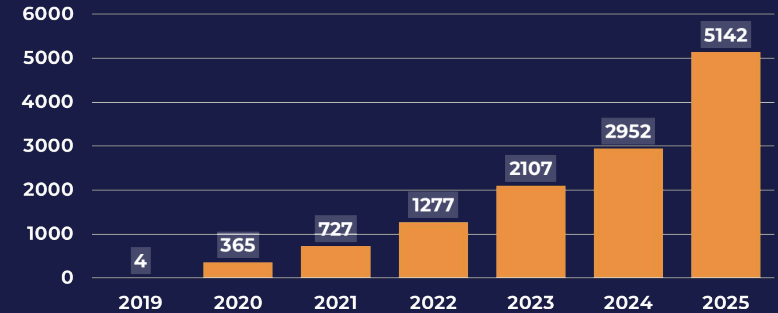

# 2025 Corporate Partner Highlights

Corporate partnerships are essential to advancing our mission. Our network of 16 corporate partners and collaborators not only provides thousands of dedicated mentors to guide our students, but also supports our mission through funding, services, and hiring opportunities for our students.

GMI's largest mentoring partner, Microsoft has now mobilized **over 2,000 mentors**. In Kenya, the **Africa Development Center WINS** pilot entered its second year, matching over **100 young women** with Microsoft mentors to pursue careers in tech. Microsoft also expanded mentorship for **Data Center Academy** students, supporting **155 mentees** in English and Spanish.



Building on GMI's 2023 pledge to support displaced learners, GMI **partnered with USA for UNHCR** to connect refugee students in the U.S. with career mentors. Through this collaboration, USA for UNHCR supporters offer guidance, connection, and professional networks, **contributing over 1,170 hours supporting refugee learners since 2024**.



A founding partner of **GMI's French-language program**, Foundever now supports students across all three program languages: English, French, and Spanish. **In 2025, Foundever's engagement grew to include 160 mentors across 25 countries**. These mentors delivered 1,000+ mentorship hours, making Foundever one of GMI's most multilingual and globally engaged partners.



Expedia has led mentor engagement across **Asia-Pacific since 2023**, becoming a key driver of GMI's global presence. In 2026, GMI will deepen collaboration with Expedia's **Inclusion Business Groups (IBGs)** to expand mentorship access.



The Baker Hughes Foundation **sponsored the launch of GMI's Spanish-language mentorship program** in 2025. Since then, over 400 students have registered for Spanish mentorships, building vital career skills in students' native language.



A new partner in 2025, **Worldpay quickly emerged as a top mentor provider**, with **225+ employees volunteering** and nearly **3,000 hours** logged. Their engagement shows how mentorship can become a core aspect to a company's social impact.

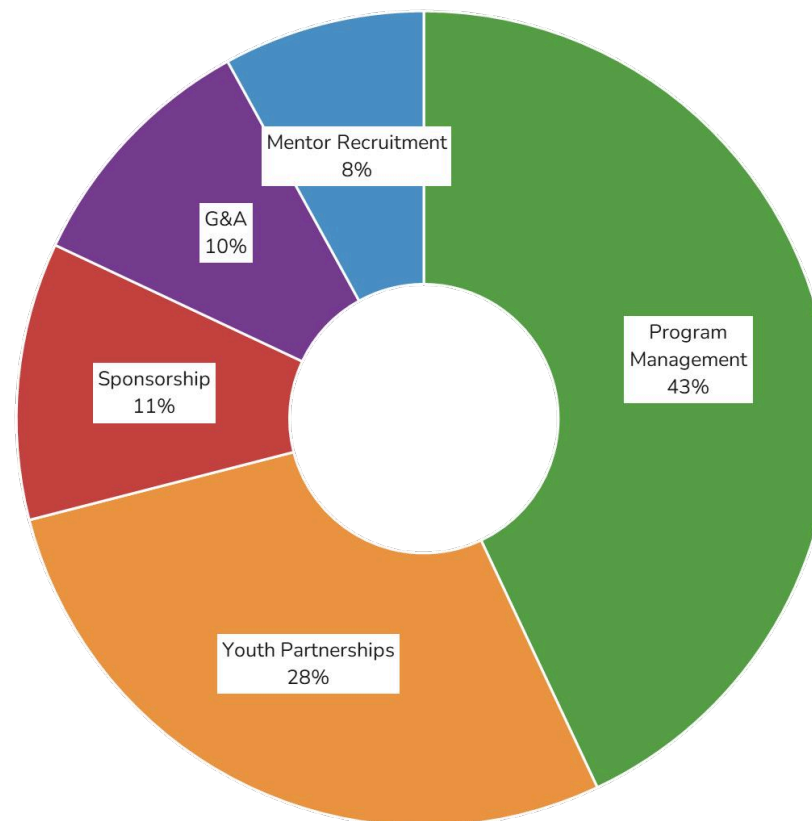
